Resident Verla Levere

Verla Levere was the best babysitter in the county, caring for children in her home for more than 50 years – day and night. Everyone called her Nanny V. She was also a single Mom who raised four children, as well as a librarian in Chesterville for more than 30 years. She was very involved in the local Legion and her donuts and pies were legendary.

Her motto was 'If you work, I work', explains her daughter Patty Thompson. "She looked after three generations of kids from the same families. In fact, she babysat for many of the staff who worked at Dundas Manor and Winchester District Memorial Hospital."

Verla was still working full-time at the age of 71 when she suffered a devastating stroke in her home. She came to Dundas Manor almost four years ago. Sadly, Verla passed away on August 20th, 2020.

"Dundas Manor was her first choice, and we were very excited to get her in there. I knew they would take care of her," notes Patty. Verla's physical limitations and inability to speak due to her stroke didn't slow her down at Dundas Manor. "She never missed an activity or whatever was going on. She was always ready to go if there was an open spot," remembers Patty. "We called her the hall monitor. She sat on the second floor and she knew everything that was going on. She would say 'wawawawa' and the nurses would go and investigate and fix whatever was wrong. She waved to everybody."

Verla was also the first resident chosen to take a ride on the special bicycle for residents, called the Bradlee bike. Patty remembers the day it arrived. "They were watching it being unloaded from the truck and her first words were 'My bike."

"My Mom's last years were happy years," sums up Patty. "The Dundas Manor team treated her with pride and dignity."



Resident Mary MacAskill

The only thing that would make Dundas Manor better for Mary MacAskill is if Tom Selleck lived there. She's a big fan! Most nights before bedtime, you'll find her watching episodes of Blue Bloods. There are even posters of Tom in her room.

Mary and her late husband Keith used to show and breed award-winning English Mastiffs. Mary fondly recalls the father and son duo named Thunder and Corporal. Both dogs went on to become Canadian Champions.

Mary has suffered from vertigo for 20 years and moved to Dundas Manor three years ago. Her daughter Tracy and her granddaughter, Hailey, live in Montreal but visit every month. Her niece lives close by, and her great-niece works at Dundas Manor. Mary says the pictures of her family are the most important things in her room.

Mary says that Dundas Manor feels like home. She loves Chinese food nights and the fresh fruit. The new Dundas Manor will be even better. On the first day, she's going to test out her bed and then go and eat. She'll be putting all those pictures up too. Mary can't wait!

Dundas Manor inspires happiness and joy. But our building does not.

When you walk into Dundas Manor, you immediately feel at home. It's warm, cozy, and inviting – just like home. Smiles, laughter, and the smell of our favourite family recipes will greet you at the door.

But the building itself needs so much work. It was designed in 1978 for 60 residents. While 38 beds were added over the years, no additional common areas or dining rooms were included in the renovations. And no one planned for many more walkers, wheelchairs, and specialized pieces of equipment.

Today, two people can barely pass by one another in the narrow hallways.

Every room is crowded. You can barely turn around in the four-resident rooms that offer no privacy. Dining space is limited. Staff members work in offices that used to be closets. And there are no spaces where everyone can come together to celebrate, sing, and enjoy.



The home's design no longer meets our residents' needs and the building itself is deteriorating. Further renovations are simply not practical or cost effective.

A new home is the answer. On March 13, 2020, the Ministry of Long-Term Care gave its formal approval to build one. Our new home will be vibrant and spacious.

Imagine new beds, new equipment, and new spaces to bring our residents and families together.



Rooms with four people will be eliminated. Hallways will be widened. New dining and gathering spaces will create opportunities for even more happiness and joy. Windows will be larger, and every resident will have their own. There will be air conditioning in all areas.

What a difference this will make for our residents and our staff!

In fact, Dundas Manor will be one of the first long-term care homes to benefit from the Ontario government's commitment to build more modern, upgraded, and expanded facilities. It will include the most current safety and infection control measures.

The magic will continue with your help.

Our building is tired. Thank goodness our team is most definitely not!

The Dundas Manor team has been planning for a new building for many years. Now we have a vision for a new home with all the comforts and conveniences that our residents, their families, and our staff deserve.

- Residents have their say in every aspect of the home. The Residents' Council is involved in everything from planning menus to hiring staff.
- Family support sessions bring everyone together to learn and ask questions.
 Ongoing communication ensures that families are partners in the care of their loved ones. Even though families are living apart, many good things can still happen in our home. The COVID-19 pandemic has strengthened these family connections. We have residents who now connect virtually with their families. It is a wonderful new option for them.

Our successful partnership with WDMH to care for our residents

- Ongoing quality inspections by the provincial government ensure Dundas Manor is a safe place. The results are impressive. It's a testament to the care, hard work, and dedication of our team.
- ✓ The COVID-19 pandemic presented a challenge and Dundas Manor was ready. The pandemic shone a light on the importance of stringent infection control protocols. Three full weeks before the Ministry of Long-Term Care made it mandatory, our Leadership team ensured that Dundas Manor staff only worked in one long-term care home to reduce the risk of infection. We immediately hired additional housekeepers to clean high-touch areas, including doorknobs, wheelchair handles, and computer screens. And ongoing testing continues for both residents and staff.

✓ We keep families together. Our residents have greater needs than ever before, and some are very complex. We have the expertise to care for them. In addition to the many health professionals and services who come to Dundas Manor to care for our residents, we also have a Nurse Practitioner on staff, and consulting physicians to ensure that the very best care practices are in place. Resident David Barr

David Barr was always a visionary thinker — very organized and methodical. His wife Penny credits three things: his high IQ, a career in engineering, and his naval training. "He had foresight throughout his life," she remembers. "All through our 62 years of marriage, David would make a suggestion and we'd think about it. A year or two down the road, you'd realize his vision was spot on."

David's approach to dementia followed the same pattern. "As the disease progressed, he kept his brain power going in an amazing way," explains Penny. "He knew himself well enough to put things in place and to be prepared. We had conversations about his future care, and I knew what he wanted."

After a stay in another long-term care home, David moved into Dundas Manor in 2016. Once he settled in, Penny knew he felt more comfortable: "I could see changes and his medications were helping. And I was so happy to have him living closer to me." Before his passing, Penny says it was the little things that made a difference for David during the time he called Dundas Manor home. She recalls that they were among the first people to take a ride on the Bradlee bike built for three. Talk about inspiring happiness and joy. "That day was just glorious. David had a sense of laughter and happiness with the breeze in his face. It was so calming for him. It's the most incredible thing," Penny says.

Penny says the new Dundas Manor will continue the tradition of caring for others: "I've been making lists of things for the new building that will enhance everyone's life. It can't happen too soon. In the meantime, I wouldn't have had David in any other place. The staff — from the activity department to the cleaning staff — were all good, friendly, kind people. The building is well past its expiry date but it's still the place of choice. Put my name on the list!"


The new Dundas Manor is well on its way. Can you help bring our dream to a reality?

On March 13, 2020, the Provincial Government of Ontario announced it will partially fund a new, safe Dundas Manor. The brand new 128 bed home is estimated to cost around \$63 million. The provincial government will fund some of the new home by giving about \$45 million.

The architects have listened to our staff, our residents, and our community to help create our dream home. Our community will need to give about \$18 million to make this safe home of our dreams a reality. We are well on our way. At the time this document was published, our community and local municipalities had already given just over \$11 million. We still need your help. We are a community that looks out for each other. We push cars out of snowbanks in the winter. Lend a hand fixing a lawn mower. Buy coffee for the person in line behind us. Offer support in times of need. Coming together to build the new, safe Dundas Manor is no different.
